The heartbeat of a new world grows louder

Dear friend,

In 2002, writer and activist Arundhati Roy declared that another world is not only possible, but "on a quiet day...I can hear her breathing." Almost two decades later, she described the COVID-19 pandemic as a "portal" to another world.

And just a month after that, following the brutal police murder of George Floyd, another portal opened. And with Black people in the lead, people across the country and around the world stepped through it.

This moment arose from the pain, outrage, vision, hope, and determination of Black folks, many of whom have been organizing for decades to end systemic racism. They did the hard work of laying the foundation for the extraordinary political and social shifts we are already seeing.

This is a moment for all of us who believe in that other world to commit to doing the work to realize it. To follow the lead of Black organizers and to play our role in dismantling white supremacy.

For Corporate Accountability that means, among other things, that as we wage global corporate campaigns, we must explicitly challenge and stop the ways corporations—and the brutal economic system they drive—exploit and endanger Black and Indigenous people and other people of color in the U.S. and around the world. Demanding a just and equitable response to the pandemic

How your support is upholding the human right to water during this health crisis

At this critical time, people everywhere are being told to vigilantly wash their hands. But it's impossible to ignore that some people cannot protect themselves because inhumane shutoff policies penalize those who are struggling or unable to pay their bills. And even as the pandemic worsened, the private water industry has called on Congress to reject federal level action to prevent water shutoffs.

That's why we organized closely with a coalition of allies to advance policies that would protect people's access to water during and following the pandemic. And we were backed by members like you, who played a critical role in moving mayors across the country to take action and adopt citywide moratoria on water and electric utility shutoffs.

With many cities and municipalities in the U.S. implementing moratoria on shutoffs, you are making it possible to help ensure that people have access to electricity, clean water, and other vital utilities during this pandemic and beyond.

Q&A

What motivates you to support Corporate Accountability?

Ever since I became a mother, I've felt strongly that I have to try and do everything I can to make sure that the world is in good shape for my son. We are currently in a time of so many crises where people and the planet are being abused, exploited, and disrespected every minute. In particular, people of color and workingclass people are disproportionately impacted by climate change, which is an unfair setup and a cruel injustice. Furthermore, we're being told that this is the way it has to be, which is just not true. Corporate Accountability is exposing and standing up to corporate

abuse in strategic ways. I believe that by interrupting this behavior and prioritizing people over profits, we can achieve systemic change for the future.

What kind of world do you want to see for your children in the future?

My ideal answer would be a world where oppression doesn't exist. It's very clear to me that the exploitation of people under capitalism is not something I want my son to witness or be a part of. I'd like for him to be in a world where women are truly leading, particularly women of color, and a world that revolves around community and connection to each other and to our Earth. I have moments where I am uncertain about whether or not this is a world we have access to, but the least I can do is to try to raise my son with the message that I am doing everything I can to fight for a better world for him.

Keeping the pressure on Big Food

"Amid a pandemic made worse by dietrelated disease that's hitting Black and Indigenous communities hardest, junk food corporations should be paying for their abuses, not stacking scientific panels and official drafting committees," says Research Director Ashka Naik, in a New York Times article on the role industry groups like the International Life Sciences Institute (ILSI) play in shaping nutrition and public health policies here in the U.S. and across the world.

From Coca-Cola and PepsiCo to McDonald's, ILSI relies on the support of its corporate benefactors to influence food and beverage policies across the world. And our recent report details just how insidiously close ILSI operates with government bodies worldwide.

Our report and its ensuing media coverage inspired more than 70,000 people and nearly 40 organizations to call on Big Soda and Big Food to cut ties with ILSI. And thanks to your support, we delivered these signatures to the executives of these corporations at their annual shareholders' meetings in April and May.

Momentum is building: It's time for corporations to stop funding junk science and peddling it as public health information.

The coronavirus pandemic has exposed deeply broken systems serving unchecked corporate interests rather than people. And nothing has illustrated the menace of rampant corporate power more strongly than the climate crisis.

For decades, the fossil fuel industry has knowingly fueled the climate crisis, funded climate denial, and blocked just climate solutions—all while profiting at the expense of communities of color and frontline communities who are least responsible for the climate crisis.

Right now, we are at a critical juncture. But the great news is that momentum is on our side! This past June, state attorneys general in Minnesota and Washington D.C. launched individual lawsuits against Big Polluters like Exxon Mobil, BP, Shell, and Koch for their decades of deception.

Building on this momentum, we are launching the second phase of our

Make Big Polluters Pay campaign alongside our international climate justice allies. We were supported by members like you, who attended our action briefing and committed to moving their mayors to advance Big Polluter liability.

Demanding the liability of Big Polluters will clear the way for addressing climate impacts and the implementation of the real, effective, and people-centered solutions we need to justly address the climate crisis. That's why we are both determined and thrilled to build global power behind the demand to make Big Polluters pay—and we couldn't do it without you.

In working with frontline communities who are most impacted by the climate crisis, we are one step closer to justice. Together, we can advance real climate solutions through our demand for liability against Big Polluters.
